TEXTILES

In December, Year 10 Textiles students enjoyed a trip to The Design Museum in London to collect primary research for their Assessment Project.

Students produced some fantastic drawings of the clothing on display in the 'Rebel Fashion' exhibition which celebrates 30 years of Young Generation British Fashion Designers, including the work of Alexander McQueen and Molly Goddard. The students were wonderful ambassadors for the school and demonstrated a range of Hatton Character Qualities throughout the day, including Creativity and Curiosity.



The Design department have been very impressed with the work produced as a result of the visit and the commitment students have demonstrated in general during their assessment window.



CHILD CRIMINAL EXPLOITATION (CCE)

A rising concern in many parts of the country, including here in Northamptonshire, is young people being exploited by others: often to take part in criminal activities including selling or carrying drugs or weapons. Children are first groomed by believing that they have a strong friendship with, or even are in a relationship with, those doing the exploiting. Whilst some of the individuals grooming your child are adults; a number of them are other children who may even be the same age as your child (and who are equally in need of support) and therefore not immediately obvious to you.



- As part of the grooming process your child will often be bought gifts or given things for free. These can be as basic as being bought fast food or as elaborate as new smartphones or trainers. Sometimes they can be given free alcohol, tobacco or even drugs. Later your child is told that they are now in debt and have to do X or Y to pay it back.
- Children who are being exploited are often increasingly secretive; and can be more protective of their privacy. This is not uncommon for many teenagers so can be hard to spot!



- “Exploiters are manipulators. They groom children and young people, make them feel special, befriend them, and gain their trust, sometimes buying them gifts or treats. Often the children themselves don’t realise they are a victim of exploitation until they are in too deep, or they may feel ashamed, embarrassed, or too afraid to tell anyone what’s happening. They may feel things have spiralled out of control, or they could have drug debts, or threatened with violence, keeping them bonded to their abuser.” Detective Chief Inspector Jen Castle, Northants Police.

WHAT SIGNS MIGHT I NOTICE AS A PARENT/CARER?

These signs may indicate that your child is subject to exploitation and we should be aware of that possibility when speaking to them about our concerns. The more of these that you notice the more concerned that you should be. The earlier that we can get support in place the better so please reach out to us if you are in need of advice or feel that your child may be at risk. The riskiest thing to do is to dismiss possible concerns as “that wouldn’t happen to my child” – our experience tells us that all children are potentially at risk.

- Being away from home more; and being in places they wouldn’t usually be spending time with older people
- Committing anti-social behaviour / low level crime
- Having more than one phone
- Changes in emotional wellbeing
- Unexplained injuries
- New and expensive possessions
- Deterioration in school performance; or going missing from school

External Agency Focus: OPFCC Youth Team



Funded by the police, crime and fire commissioner; this agency supports young people of secondary school age to keep themselves safe in the local community. They are a free service and a referral can be completed by the academy at your request where emerging concerns around risk of exploitation first come to light. They can help your child to understand what grooming and exploitation looks like and how to remove themselves from risky situations. Often young people are exploited (or groomed in preparation for exploitation) online. This can be through their smartphone but often frequently occurs through live chats on gaming platforms such as Xbox or PlayStation. Do you know who your child is playing games online with, who they are speaking to, and the content of those conversations? Ideally online gaming should take place in a communal area such as the main living room rather than in a bedroom so that it is easier for you to monitor this. CHILD EXPLOITATION WEBINAR

OBJECTIVES:

- For parents/carers to gain an understanding of child exploitation and the different kinds of exploitation.
- For parents/carers to gain awareness of the factors that increase the risk of exploitation.
- To show the links between going missing, adverse childhood experiences and child exploitation.

OUTCOMES:

- For parents to be more aware of the signs that their child is at risk or is involved in child exploitation.
- For parents to understand their role and the role of others to keep their child safe and to reduce the risk of harm
- For parents to be aware of local services and who they can contact for support.

BICYCLE SAFETY

At this time of year with darker mornings and evenings we'd like to remind you of the following bicycle safety information:

- All bicycles are legally required to have front white and rear red lights and these must be lit when travelling when the sun has set. A bicycle must also be fitted with a rear red reflector and amber pedal reflectors
- Students should not ride their bikes on the school site, they should dismount from their bike at the entrance of the driveway to the school and push the bike the remainder of the way. Similarly on exit of the site they should push their bike out of the school site until they have safely exited the drive.

SITE SAFETY

We take the safety of our students seriously and would like to remind parents and carers that the entrance to school needs to be as clear as possible at all times. In order for us to achieve this we kindly request that parents or carers take note of the following:

- There is no access to the school site for parental vehicles this includes the driveway
- The driveway should not be used as a turning point
- There should be no stopping on the zig-zags or white lines near to the school, this includes quick drop-offs
- Be courteous to our neighbours when parking near the school and avoid blocking driveways
- Encourage walking where possible



E-SCOOTER INFORMATION

We understand that buying an e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can get them from many popular retailers.

However, the current law is clear

You can buy one but you can't ride it on a UK public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place an e-scooter can be used is on private land.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), so they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements, such as:

- MOT
- Licensing
- Tax
- Insurance

Some e-scooters have exceptions to this as part of the government trial but this does not extend to any personal e-scooters.

What happens if I am stopped by Police?



Section 59 of the police reform act allows police to issue a warning if a vehicle is being used in a manner which may cause alarm, distress or annoyance. Being issued with this warning does not stop the e-scooter being seized.

Police can seize any private scooter if they are being used on a public road or footpath and the rider may also be liable for prosecution for traffic offences.

This is also the case for anyone using Voi scooters without a licence or registering with the Voi app as this is what covers you under their insurance.




Voi are a company that are running a trial of the use of e-scooters in Northampton but will be expanding the use of the scooters across the county.

Voi e-scooters have an exemption as part of the government trial which make them legal for use on the road.

To use a Voi scooter you must:

- Be over 18 AND
- Have a full UK or foreign licence or a UK provisional licence
- Have an account registered with Voi via their website or app
- Only use the e-scooters on roads limited to 30mph (not on pavements) or designated cycle lanes.
- Always have full control of the e-scooter whilst you are riding and not allow yourself to be distracted by other things.

You must not:

- Use an e-scooter if you are under 18
- Use an e-scooter if you do not have the correct licence
- Ride the e-scooters on pavements
- Ride an e-scooter under the influence of drink/drugs
- Ride an e-scooter using someone else's Voi account
- Have more than one rider on an e-scooter at a time
